March 7, 2016

The City Council of the City of Knoxville, Iowa convened in regular session Monday, March 7, 2016 at 6:15 p.m. in the City Hall Council Chambers. Mayor Brian Hatch presided and the following Council Members were present: Dawn Allspach-Kline, Rick Kingery, James Lane, Cal Stephens and Craig Kelley. Mayor Hatch asked for Citizen/Public Comments regarding items not on the agenda. Bill McDonald 310 S. Second, requested to be placed on the March 21st agenda to discuss the alley near his residence. Motion by Allspach-Kline; seconded by Stephens to accept handout into record, all ayes.

Sexual Assault Awareness Month Proclamation

Sexual Assault Awareness Month calls attention to the fact that sexual violence is widespread and impacts every person in this community.

Rape, sexual assault, and sexual harassment harm our community, and statistics show one in five women and one in 71 men will be raped at some point in their lives (Black et al., 2011).

Child sexual abuse prevention must be a priority to confront the reality that one in six boys and one in four girls will experience a sexual assault before age 18 (Dube et al., 2005).

Young people experience heightened rates of sexual violence, and youth ages 12-17 were 2.5 times as likely to be victims of rape or sexual assault (Snyder & Sickmund, 2006).

On campus, one in five women and one in 16 men are sexually assaulted during their time in college (Krebs, Lindquist, Warner, Fisher, & Martin, 2007).

We must work together to educate our community about sexual violence prevention, supporting survivors, and speaking out against harmful attitudes and actions.

Prevention is possible when everyone gets involved. The first step is increasing education, awareness, and community involvement. It's time for all of us to take action to create a safer environment for all.

I join advocates and communities across the country in taking action to prevent sexual violence. April is Sexual Assault Awareness Month, and each day of the year is an opportunity to create change for the future.

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into by and between the BNSF RAILWAY COMPANY, a Delaware corporation, hereinafter referred to as the "BNSF", and the City of Knoxville, hereinafter referred to as the "Agency".

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, elimination of a highway-rail grade separated crossing by closing the road includes the abandonment and permanent vacating of roadway right-of-way across the railroad right-of-way, and

WHEREAS, the BNSF agrees to pay all costs of the removal of the grade separated crossing structure at no cost to the Agency, and

WHEREAS, the Agency in cooperation with BNSF will permanently close the Attica Road highway-rail grade separated crossing DOT No. 063213J, and

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of these facts, the parties hereto agree as follows:

- SECTION 1.** The Agency after having executed this agreement, and after taking all actions necessary to permanently close and vacate the Attica Road Public Crossing DOT No. 063213J and easement across the BNSF's property, and after removing both roadway approaches and installing the appropriate signage and end-of-road treatment in the form of either permanent barricades or natural barricades (re-establishing parallel ditch line, etc.) – located no closer than 50 feet to nearest rail, will submit a statement of completion to the BNSF.
- SECTION 2.** The BNSF hereby agrees to pay all costs of the removal of the grade separated crossing structure.
- SECTION 3.** The BNSF further agrees to remove the grade separated crossing structure, upon the receipt of the above mentioned statement.

- SECTION 5.** The Agency agrees, that this crossing will remain closed and will not be re-opened by the Agency.
- SECTION 6.** The Agency and BNSF agree that no record of an easement has been found and Agency forfeits its right to any past easements.

WHEREAS, The BNSF Railway Company, the State of Iowa, and the City of Knoxville have joined together to consolidate redundant and unnecessary street/railroad crossings; and

WHEREAS, the City of Knoxville, met in regular session on _____, _____, and there discussed and approved the railroad crossing closure at Attica Road in the City Limits of Knoxville;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY OF KNOXVILLE, that the [Attica Road (063213J)] crossing be permanently closed to vehicular traffic and vacated at the time the City places appropriate end-of-road treatment on both of the roadway approaches at a minimum distance of 50 feet from nearest rail of the track. The City will then remove both roadway approaches between the end-of-road treatment and the track. The Railroad will remove the wagon bridge.

In lieu of installing permanent end-of-road barriers, the City may re-establish the natural parallel ditch line.

City shall coordinate removal of roadway approaches with the BNSF Roadmaster in order for the Railroad to provide the required flagging for notification of train operations.

ORDINANCE NO. 16-02

AN ORDINANCE CLOSING A PORTION OF A STREET LOCATED WITHIN
THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF KNOXVILLE, IOWA

BE IT ENACTED by the City Council of the City of Knoxville, Iowa:

SECTION 1. PURPOSE. The purpose of this Ordinance is to vacate that portion of the described street and thereby relieve the City of Knoxville, Iowa, of the responsibility of its maintenance and supervision and also to comply with the Highway-Rail Grade Separated Crossing Closure Agreement entered into between the City and BNSF Railway Company.

SECTION 2. FACTS FOUND. The Council of the City of Knoxville, Iowa hereby makes the following findings:

1. The described portion of said street is not needed for the use of the public, in consideration of the removal of the rail crossing in that area, and therefore, its maintenance at public expense is no longer justified.
2. The vacation will not deny owners of property abutting on the street reasonable access to their property.
3. It is necessary to vacate that portion of the street in order to comply with the Highway-Rail Grade Separated Crossing Closure Agreement entered into with BNSF Railway Company.
4. Notice of the intended vacation, including the date on which the Council will consider the vacating, was publishing a paper of general of circulation in the City of Knoxville and posted at the Knoxville City Hall no more than twenty (20) days and no less than four (4) days prior to the date set for the hearing.

SECTION 3. VACATION. That portion of Attica Road lying fifty (50) feet on either side of the Attica Road Public Crossing DOT No. 063213J, Knoxville, Marion County, Iowa is hereby declared vacated.

SECTION 4. REPEALER. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 5. RETENTION. After the closing and vacating of said street, it is the intention of the City of Knoxville, Iowa to retain possession of said street and any utilities located therein.

SECTION. 6. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE. If any section, provision or part of this Ordinance shall be adjudged to be invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole or any section, provision or part thereof not adjudicated invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 7. WHEN EFFECTIVE. This Ordinance shall be in effect from and after its final passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

8. Expenses: No expense shall be incurred by the Operator for or on account of the Owner without first obtaining written permission from the Owner. The Operator agrees to take no actions that might cause a mechanic's or other lien to be imposed on the real estate and agrees to indemnify the Owner if actions are taken by the Operator that result in such a lien being imposed.

9. Repair and Maintenance: Operator will not be responsible for repair and maintenance of fences unless existing fence is damaged during the course of Operator activity.

10. Operator's Duties: Operator agrees to farm the real estate in a good and husband-like manner and consistent with the terms of the lease and further agrees to control all noxious weeds on the real estate covered by the lease. 13. Transfer of Interest: The Operator agrees not to lease or sublet any part of the real estate nor assign this lease to any other person, nor sublease any or all of the property described herein without prior written permission of the Owner. This lease shall be binding upon the heirs, assignees, or successors in interest of both parties. If the Owner should sell or otherwise transfer title to the real estate, the Owner will do so subject to the provisions of this lease.

14. Changes in Lease Terms: The conduct, representation, or statement of either party, by act or omission shall not be construed as a material alteration of this lease until such provision is reduced to writing and executed by both parties as an addendum to this lease.

15. Right of Entry: The Owner reserves the right to enter the premises at any time for any reason. Upon notice of the lease termination, the Operator agrees to permit the Owner or Owner's lessee or agent to enter the premises to do customary tillage and operations on any land from which the current crops have been removed.

16. Violation of Terms: If the Operator fails to keep any agreement contained in this lease, the lease shall then terminate and the Owner or legal representative shall have the right to take immediate possession of the premises.

17. Other Provisions: The Owner shall be allowed to periodically enter the real estate for the injected application of liquid sludge from the Knoxville Wastewater Treatment Plant and the Owner shall provide fourteen (14) days advance notice to the Operator of such intended application.

18. Arbitration: Any disputes between the Owner and Operator not covered by the terms of this lease may be submitted by either party for arbitration at a reasonable fee by three (3) disinterested persons, one of whom shall be selected by the Owner, one by the Operator, and a third by the previously named two (2). If and when disputes are submitted, a majority decision of the arbitrators shall be binding upon the parties to the lease. Costs of such arbitration shall be equally shared by Owner and Operator.
